## 75th Anniversary of the Bombing of Hiroshima and the Feast of Transfiguration

6th August will mark the 75th anniversary of the dropping of the Atomic Bomb on Hiroshima. On this same day, we keep the Feast of the Transfiguration of Our Lord.

#### **Bank Fraud Warning**

From Rev Denise Herbert, Diocesan Protection Officer (Safeguarding): Officers in North East Fife are continuing their investigation and warning the public to be on their guard following several recent high-value bank frauds.

In the last three weeks, three people aged 62, 74 and 84 from the St Andrews area have been the victim of high-value frauds . In each of these cases the victims have received telephone calls from someone with a reported local accent, purporting to be from the fraud team of their local bank branch and appear to be calling from a genuine bank telephone number.

Community Sergeant Matt Spencer from St Andrews Police Station said: "I would ask everyone to be on their guard from any type of online or telephone scam.

"The criminals who use these sophisticated tactics, go to great lengths to appear legitimate including making it appear they are calling from a genuine bank telephone number. It is important to remember that a genuine caller from your bank would never ask for your banking or personal details as they already have it. Your bank will not ask you to transfer money during an unsolicited call nor will they ask you to allow them access to your online or telephone banking, so if asked, politely end the call. It is best to call your bank back on a number you have sourced yourself, ideally using a different phone, or attend at your local branch for advice. If you are unsure, end the call and ask a friend, relative or the Police for advice. Any victims of these crimes or anyone with concerns regarding calls they have received should contact their local police station through 101. If you are in any doubt that the call is not genuine then please end the call, your bank will understand."

#### Face Covering Update: 4th August

From the SEC on 4th August: "People have had more experience of wearing face coverings on public transport and in shops and similar settings and so public perceptions of wearing face coverings are changing. The Scottish Government guidance for places of worship recommends the wearing of face coverings where physical distancing is compromised, the Advisory Group has decided that it is appropriate to strengthen guidance to <u>encourage the wear-</u> ing of face coverings by all worshippers attending public worship or individual prayer. <u>Read here.</u>
