Christmas Greetings from Bishop Andrew

Christmas 2020 is a very, very different celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ. The celebrations in our homes and our churches will feel limited as the pandemic (and the latest restrictions) prevent us from gathering together with family and friends as we would wish. It has been an extraordinary year ever since the 'hard lockdown' back in March: a year of pain and grief and loss. But it has also been a year of acts of kindness and support. It has been a year of technical creativity as 'Zoom' and 'Facebook' become the place where churches can worship and families can connect.

<u>Covid Update for Scottish Episcopal</u> <u>Church: 'level 4' from Boxing Day</u>



On Saturday it was announced that, as of Boxing Day, all of Scotland (other than outlying islands) will go into level 4 of the pandemic restrictions for three weeks. This is due to a new strain of the virus (mainly being found in England) that seems much more infectious. Family plans for Christmas have been affected by the limiting on travel and Christmas 'bubbles': it is hard and painful to have a sudden change to travel and family celebrations.

Our church worship after Christmas will also be affected by the change to 'level 4' from 26th December. This limits church numbers to 20 and people cannot cross a local authority boundary to attend church.

Many churches have reacted to this news already. Some are suspending 'in-person' worship and returning to live-streamed or virtual gatherings. Some, with smaller numbers, are continuing to gather under these new constraints.

The decision to suspend (and provide alternatives) or to continue is a local decision and will be driven by the make up of the congregation, the local authority areas where they live, the usual numbers attending and, importantly, the view on the risks associated with travelling and gathering as the pandemic continues. There are no 'right' or 'wrong' answers and the clergy and vestry will make a judgement, with the bishop's guidance as required, as to the best way forward for each community.

Whatever decision a church makes – as you move through the next few weeks please be gentle with yourselves and others and also please err on the side of caution as you make your decisions.

"Connecting Scotland" Programme

The SEC would like to draw to your attention information regarding the Connecting Scotland Programme which aims to assist those who are "digitally excluded" to get online.

The programme allows organisations to apply for certain categories of individual to be supplied with an iPad with mobile connectivity to enable them to access the internet. This may be of particular interest to congregations with elderly church members or those with disabilities who are not currently digitally connected or families with children on low incomes. The programme is administered via local authorities. As part of the programme, the organisation needs to be in a position to provide a "digital champion", who could be a volunteer, and who would receive training under the Government scheme (and who need not be an IT expert) to help individuals receiving their iPad to get connected and make use of it.
