### Installation service for Canon Elizabeth Thomson, the new Provost for St Paul's Cathedral, Dundee: 19th June at 3pm

Bishop Andrew is delighted to inform all in the diocese that Canon Dr Elizabeth Thomson will be instituted as Rector and installed as Provost of St Paul's Cathedral, Dundee on Saturday 19th June at 3pm. Elizabeth is moving back to Scotland after some years of ministry in the Church of England, most recently as Canon Missioner and Sub-Dean of Derby Cathedral.

The service of installation is taking place with the current limitations on numbers and worship from the pandemic. Attending 'in-person' is only possible for those already invited and/or confirmed by the cathedral admin. ### Advanced Notice: Licensing of Priest for Carnoustie and Monifieth

Bishop Andrew can confirm that the services of licensing for the Rev Martin Allwood as priest in charge of Holy rood Carnoustie and Holy Trinity Monifieth will take place on Saturday 10th July. The detailed planning is still underway, but there will be 'in-person' services at both churches that day. The intention is to livestream these services to let a wider congregation than the number-limited services take part in the celebrations. 'In-person' attendance will only be possible for those invited by the vestries.

## Updated guidance on coronavirus

### Some more changes: Revised Bishops' pastoral guidance & government relaxation on recreational activities in church buildings

Revised guidance on pastoral and liturgical matters have been issued by the College of Bishops. These can be found at: <https://www.scotland.anglican.org/coronavirus-updates/>. This update brings the guidance up-to-date with the current state of levels in Scotland and offers some very minor amendments in the guidance on worship. This guidance has not changed in any fundamental way, but has some changes in emphasis to reflect the months of experience that churches now have in Covid safe worship.

There has been a major change in government guidance on recreational activities in church halls <https://www.gov.scot/publications/coronavirus-covid-19-phase-3-guidance-for-the-safe-use-of-places-of-worship/pages/other-permitted-uses/> states:

"Recreational and social groups

“Organised adult indoor activities, such as those run by recognised charitable, not-for-profit and political organisations and properly constituted clubs can take place in Levels 2-0. This does not include ad hoc or informal social activities which should still follow the rules on gatherings appropriate to that setting (indoors or outdoors). One off social events such as birthday parties are still not permitted at these levels.”

Some questions are being asked by churches about the possibility of resuming church social activities, such as receptions, outdoor parties etc. The relaxation above is for regular scheduled social activities, rather than ‘one-off’ events, which we can confirm that these are under the usual ‘social interaction’ rules for level 2 (Dundee) and level 1 (other parts of the diocese) areas. This is an increasingly complex system to understand and apply, so for information, the numbers that can meet under the government regulations are:

Level 2 (Dundee):

- 6 people from 3 households in private homes.
- 6 people from 3 households in an indoor public place (e.g. in a church hall etc.)
- 8 people from 8 households outdoors.

Level 1 (Other areas in the diocese)

- 6 people from 3 households in private homes.
- 8 people from 3 households in an indoor public place.
- 12 people from 12 households outdoors.

Discussions are ongoing about the resumption of in-person business meetings e.g. vestries. Some other charities and churches have started developments in this area as the ‘levels’ have reduced over the past few weeks—we will send out information once the SEC policy on resumption of these meetings has been confirmed.

## **Diocesan Safeguarding—BBC Radio Report on Safeguarding children**

The Rev Denise Herbert, diocesan safeguarding officer, wishes to share details of an important safeguarding issue. Radio 4’s programme ‘File on Four’ recently reported on the devastating effect on children of online pornography which is said to be easily accessible. There are some sexually explicit details in the radio broadcast but it is an important programme for parents with young and teen children, for teachers and other interest groups.

The programme reports that it is known that children as young as eight years are able to access and look at this material. Guidance for parents, carers and others is signposted from the broadcast.
