Afghanistan – What we can do?

Bishop Andrew writes: We have all watched with alarm and horror the events unfolding in Afghanistan as the NATO forces in that country have withdrawn, the Afghan government has collapsed and the Taliban coalition has seized power. The concerns that all are feeling are for such a wide range of issues. The record of the Taliban with women's rights from their previous time in power is truly appalling. The safety and stability of a country that has suffered so much over the past few years is very much in doubt. Many charities and relief agencies are operating in that region and their safety must be matter of great concern. There is also the very real anger from many people who served, or have family members who served in the military in Afghanistan. So many servicemen and women risked their lives and many were injured or killed. Has their service and willingness to bring peace and order in Afghanistan been wasted? That is a hard question.

As Christians we can and should, of course, pray for this political and humanitarian disaster. We should pray for wisdom in all political leaders involved. We should pray for peace and justice for all in Afghanistan.

And there is an unfolding humanitarian crisis with refugees and other displaced people. Some are being brought to the UK from Afghanistan to be permanently resettled. They will be given government funding and support, but churches can offer a welcome in the time of transition as they arrive in this strange, small northern European country. That was the experience of the refugees from Syria who arrived in the UK in the 2010s. Some people are now displaced in the areas around Afghanistan itself. There are several large charity appeals that have been started in the past few days to support them (e.g. in the UK for support in transition). Churches or individuals might choose to donate and support these appeals. The agencies in Afghanistan and in the surround area will be doing vital work to protect the weak and vulnerable in this time of crisis.

"Mike, who I met when he was serving in the Royal Air Force at RAF Goose Bay in Labrador Canada, and I seem to have moved a great deal throughout our married lives. Where ever we have put down roots I have always sought out a worshipping community, as a result my church experience has ranged from cathedral to heatless, sans electricity churches on the edge of wildernesses. For me, regardless of where we have ended up, it is the relationships that have mattered most, they being our relationships with God, with each other, the communities we live in and the world beyond our church walls.

Perhaps the phrase 'imagining the future' speaks of what lies ahead. In saying that I am not suggesting that time honoured traditions and expressions of faith should be abandoned but that we should prayerfully consider what God is asking us to do using all that he has given us to experience and spread the message of his love. Recently I came across the phrase that blessings are found when giftings and needs meet...together I hope that we will be able to use our individual gifts to work towards meeting the needs of those we live alongside and in doing this we will be blessed.
