War in Ukraine: Church Response

The ongoing war in Ukraine continues to dominate the news and thoughts and prayers of people throughout the world. The now millions of refugees fleeing to neighbouring countries is being described as the fastest growing refugee crisis since the Second World War.

The overwhelming news of warfare and destruction and the cost in innocent lives lost and displaced demands a church response. There are many areas to consider, including:



Refugees: lobby to improve UK response

There is great concern among church leaders that the UK response to refugees from Ukraine, including relatives of those with a right to live and work in the UK, is not proving to be adequate. Diocesan Synod 2022: Report

Brechin Diocesan Synod took place last Saturday (5th March 2022) in St Mary's Broughty Ferry. This was the first non-worship 'business meeting' of the Diocese held since March 2020, with the pandemic constraints. Nearly 40 people gathered, clergy and lay representatives of the Diocese's charges, as well as reps on Provincial Boards and the Diocesan Council.

Business included greetings from Bishop Betsey Monnot (Iowa) and Bishop Dalcy Dlamini (Swaziland), our companionship bishops. There was also a review by the Bishop of progress on the Diocesan strategy, as initiated in 2019, along with draft financial results for the finan-



cial year 2021-22. Budget and quota for 2021-22 were formally approved.

An item of Provincial business was the proposed revision of the 1982 'Blue Book' liturgy, spoken about by Dr John Davies from the Provincial Liturgy Committee. The changes are a consolidation of many years of permitted changes to less gendered language and new eucharistic prayers, e.g. for Christmas

and Epiphany. The proposal was strongly supported by the Synod.

Rev Canon Kenneth Gibson spoke to the Diocesan statistics, showing (again) a gentle decline in membership. Kenneth explained the context and reality of statistics and gave cause for some positive reflection.

Elections took place for various posts, including all the Diocesan representatives and alternates for General Synod. In the business of boards and committees, Lay Canon Pat Millar was thanked as she stepped back from Diocesan Council after two terms as a lay member, and also many years serving on the Standing Committee and Administration Board and other previous structures of the Diocese.



It was also announced that Allan Duffus, the Diocesan Treasurer, would retire this coming year, so although he was starting this next year as treasurer, this would be his last spring Synod. Bob Main, treasurer at the Cathedral, was appointed as assistant treasurer for the Diocese to help with the transition.

The next spring Synod will be on Saturday 4th March 2023, but the Bishop announced that he intended to call an autumn Synod to explore environmental and carbon-zero issues in more detail.

The Synod ended with confirmation of acts of synod, prayer and final blessing.

Bishop's Lent Appeal

Bishop Andrew's Lent Appeal this year will be equally shared between two areas that urgently need support in 2022. As in previous years, there will be 'global' and 'local' elements.

The 'global' half will be donated to our ongoing projects in the Diocese of Swaziland, where Covid-19 and ongoing civil unrest have made a fragile society even more vulnerable. The help that Companion Dioceses Iowa and Brechin give to projects such as the 'Neighbourhood Care Points' (NCPs) in Eswatini makes a massive difference in food and care for vulnerable children and families throughout the country.

The 'local' share of the appeal will be donated to 'Energy Action Scotland' - a charity working to end fuel poverty in Scotland. The current UK situation with soaring fuel prices and rising costs of living is making many vulnerable people's situations unbearable and the war in Ukraine may make this even worse. <u>https://www.eas.org.uk/</u>
