Bishop 'Ted' Luscombe RIP: 1924-2022

The Rt Rev Edward Luscombe, former Bishop of Brechin and Primus of the SEC has died at the age of 97. Bishop Ted, as he was best known, was Bishop of Brechin for 15 years and served as Primus from 1985 until his retirement in 1990. Born Lawrence Edward Luscombe in Devon in 1924, he attended Torquay Boys' Grammar School and then Kelham Theological College before seeing active service with the British Indian Army during the Second World War. He left the army in 1947 at the time of the partition of India, having reached the rank of Major. He qualified as a chartered accountant in 1952 and worked for 11 years as a partner with Glasgow firm Galbraith Dunlop & Co before he was ordained deacon at St Mary's Cathedral in Glasgow in 1963. Previously he had held the posts of vestry member, lay representative and diocesan treasurer in Glasgow & Galloway.

He then resumed training for the priesthood at St Boniface College in Warminster (under the auspices of King's College, London) and was ordained priest in 1964 during his curacy at St Margaret's Newlands in Glasgow. In 1966, he became rector of St Barnabas, Paisley.

In 1971, he moved to Brechin Diocese, where he ministered until retirement. He was Provost of St Paul's Cathedral to 1975, then was Bishop of Brechin until 1990. He had a lasting impact on the Diocese in his fifteen years as Bishop, with a mix of confidence, good pastoral care and financial sense. He also became the Primus of the SEC in 1985. He was active in the Anglican Communion. He chaired the Inter-Anglican Finance Committee and the Primates' Special Committee on the Anglican Centre in Rome. He was made an Honorary Canon of Trinity Cathedral in Davenport, Iowa, an officer of the Venerable Order of St John and was awarded the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws by the University of Dundee.

In retirement, he gained an MPhil and PhD research degrees from the University of Dundee where he was made an honorary research fellow in modern history. Retirement also allowed Bishop Ted time to write a series of books about the history of the church and some of its notable clergy. He was also a Trustee of the Scottish Episcopal Church. He was pre -deceased by his wife, Dr Doris Morgan, and is survived by his daughter Jean.

Bishop Ted is having a private family funeral followed by a public memorial service in St Paul's Cathedral, Dundee, on <u>Tuesday 7th June 2022 at</u> <u>11.30am</u>. All clergy are very welcome to robe (choir dress, hoods optional) and process. Tuesday 7th June at 7.30pm: "Music for Midsummer", A concert at St. Mary's Broughty Ferry

On Tuesday 7th June at 7.30pm St. Mary's Church, Broughty Ferry welcomes Richard Durrant, as part of his 27 day "Music for Midsummer" tour 2022.

Richard is an English guitarist and composer. He studied guitar, cello and composition at the Royal College of Music in London. Since his debut at the Purcell room, London in July 1986, Richard has gained an international reputation as one of the great guitarists of his generation. He has pursued both performance and composition in an unconventional career that has avoided categorisation and he has built a faithful, ever expanding audience who warm to his unpretentious manner and natural skills of communication

At this concert Richard will play his Sussex downland inspired "The Crest, The Coombe, The Twitten" and the richly melodic "Book of Spells" on a concert guitar made from a 5,000 year old English oak. You will also hear unaccompanied Bach played on a ukulele made from cedar rescued from the Oregon "Biscuit Fire". Now in its eighth year, Richard's 2022 musical pilgrimage takes him from the magnificent St Magnus Cathedral on Orkney, through the UK to Brighton Open Air Theatre for midsummer and further concerts in Sussex and Kent. Once again, to reduce his carbon footprint, Richard will be travelling between venues by bicycle carrying his instruments on a trailer.
