Environmental: Carbon Audit of Churches—carry out by 25th May 2022

We suggest this is an action for charge treasurers to gather the utility bills for 2021 and, with the cleric or charge environmental group (if you have one), to enter this data into the '[Energy Footprint Analyser](#)' provided by the Province. The War in Ukraine

Church Responses

The war in Ukraine continues to dominate the news and our thoughts and prayers. We also need to remain aware of many other areas of the world where war and injustice is ever-present.

In Ukraine, where the war shows no sign of ending soon, the ongoing refugee crisis continues to demand resources, especially in the countries around Ukraine. Below are some pointers on how we can respond.

Pray for Peace

Most importantly: Please pray for peace in Ukraine. Pray that all combatants act in accordance with international law, and pray that politicians do all they can to work for peace. Pray for all victims of this horrific violence in Ukraine. Pray for other parts of world suffering war and violence.

Donate money for refugee support

Refugee support—opt-in and lobby

The UK response to refugees has been mixed in effectiveness and response. Some Ukrainians are now safely in the UK, but some aspects of the UK government schemes have been found to be not ideal (e.g. a troubling the lack of safeguarding control in matching some hosts and refugees, the slow progress in issuing visas and this turning into safe arrival of families fleeing the violence). Lobbying the Westminster government is an entirely reasonable action that church members can take to improve the UK response to this still fast developing situation.

Aberlour Charity support for Ukraine

SallyAnn Kelly, Chief Executive of Aberlour (a charity supported by and rooted in the SEC), writes the following on the work they have been doing to support the Ukraine humanitarian response.

“Right now in Ukraine, parents fearing for their lives are taking desperate measures to protect their children; writing their blood types and relatives’ contact information on their skin.

“Such fear and despair is hard to imagine.

“But today I’m writing to you to let you know that Aberlour will be doing our bit to help some of the Ukrainian children and families due to arrive in Scotland: providing a safe, welcoming home for people who have been forced from theirs at a newly adapted facility in Dumfries and Galloway.

“Our contribution to Scotland’s humanitarian effort may be small, but we believe it is significant; demonstrating that we stand in solidarity with Ukraine’s children whose young lives have been blighted by bombs and bullets.

“Every child should have the chance to thrive, not merely survive, and we stand ready to help our Ukrainian neighbours settle into their new lives in safety.”
