St Paul's Cathedral Dundee: Choral Evensong with Installation of Canons

The Rev Professor David Brown was made Canon Theologian, a new post for the cathedral. His career in academia includes the Universities of Oxford, Durham and St Andrews, and he has an especial interest in the interaction of theology and culture, especially the arts. The former Provost of the cathedral, Dr Elizabeth Thomson was made an honorary canon as she moves on to a new national role as the Provincial Director of Ordinands for the Scottish Episcopal Church. She has served as the Provost for three years, having been in ministry at Derby Cathedral and in the Dioceses of Oxford and Bath and Wells prior to arriving in Dundee. Bishop Andrew appointed the new Canons, with consultation with the Chapter, several of whom were in attendance to assist in their installation.

The service was attend by friends and colleagues from around the Diocese and also from other local churches and settings. The service was followed by a reception and party for the cathedral to officially say 'goodbye' to Elizabeth and thank her for time as Provost of the cathedral.

Energy Footprint Tool to Begin Roll Out

The 'Energy Footprint Tool' EFT for the SEC is now ready to be used and vestry treasurers have been informed by the Net Zero Team on how to get registered to use the tool. The EFT is an online software tool developed for the SEC to gather data on greenhouse gas emissions across the Province. This data is crucial in measuring our contribution to climate change, shaping strategy, and reducing our carbon footprint as part of the Net Zero Action Plan.
