#### Community Resilience Following Unrest and Violence in the UK: Message from Faith Leaders Including Scottish Episcopal Primus, Bishop Mark Strange.

It was encouraging that on the 7 August there was little reported unrest in the UK with peaceful counter protests displacing anti-immigration events, but following the violent disorder that had taken place in various towns and cities across parts of the UK in recent days, the First Minister of Scotland, John Swinney MSP hosted a meeting today (7 August) alongside Equalities Minister Kaukab Stewart MSP, with religious leaders and leaders of refugee communities to discuss the situation.

The Most Rev Mark Strange, Primus of the Scottish Episcopal Church, was among those invited to the meeting, about which the First Minister said: "My positive meetings today were intended to provide reassurance that this is a time for solidarity and that we are united in our opposition to anyone who would seek to use disorder to divide people. I have drawn together faith leaders from across communities in Scotland to express our solidarity together - we respect each other and we want everybody to be safe within our society."

After the meeting, Bishop Mark said: "I am grateful to the First Minister for holding this discussion. This is a time for all of our communities to come together and unite against hate.

"Although there have been no incidents in Scotland at this time, it is still incumbent on us all to show care and compassion for those in our communities who are frightened and wary, as well as those with family and friends in places where violence has occurred. "Across the Scottish Episcopal Church I am aware that many have been praying and offering support to those affected by this climate of fear and anxiety. The racist, islamophobic rhetoric behind this disorder has no place in the UK, and my prayers and solidarity go out to those affected directly as well as those who are fearful for themselves and their communities. I ask that those prayers and offers of support continue over the coming hours and days.

"Please also pray for those whose job it is to maintain and restore order: the police, emergency services and health workers, as well as those who are working hard to clean up and repair damage where it has occurred." (Text from SEC Facebook)

## Bishop Andrew attends Peace Vigil at HMNB Faslane

Bishop Andrew writes: "After the passing of a motion at the SEC General Synod 2024, stating that the church's position on nuclear weapons is "...that the use of nuclear weapons can never be theologically justified, and the church commits to a policy of advocating for arms control, disarmament and non-proliferation of nuclear weapons", it was a privilege

to be able to attend, as a Scottish Episcopal Church representative, the Justice and Peace Scotland annual Vigil held at Faslane Naval Base on the 3rd August 2024. This base is the home for the UK fleet of Trident nuclear missile armed submarines.

"I joined the Rt Revd Dr Shaw Paterson, the Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, and the Most Reverend William Nolan, the Roman Catholic Archbishop of Glasgow, at the service held outside the gates of the naval base. We all called for an end to threat of nuclear war, and for a prophetic challenge to the UK and other governments who continue to hold these weapons in a world with such poverty and injustice. I stated the position that the SEC have now taken and I shared, in particular, the voices of the young people that we heard at our General Synod, calling for an end to the fear for our future that the threat of nuclear war still brings to all humanity and the whole of creation. I also expressed my support for the women and men of the armed forces who work to keep the world safe and give us the freedom to be able to protest but stated that our protest must be that nuclear weapons should not be held in our names."

The Peace Vigil takes place each year at Faslane Naval Base, and is an opportunity for worship to be offered and peace called for my the Christian communities of Scotland. Bishop Ted Luscombe, former Bishop of Brechin and Primus of the SEC, was instrumental in setting up the St Drostan's retreat centre at Tarfside, and was a keen supporter of the work of the Lodge throughout his life. Coffee and tea will be served in the Lodge afterwards.
